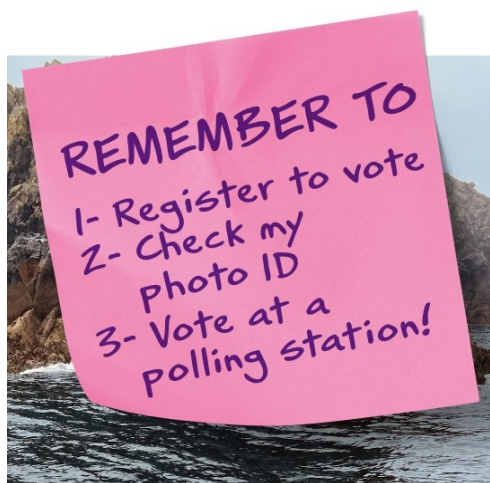

Church News

We are delighted to congratulate Assistant Church warden Pat Jones on her award of British Empire Medal in the New Year Honours List. A wonderful achievement and richly deserved – Pat never does less than her best at whatever she does, be it riding for the disabled, dog training or church work, and her care and support for others is second to none.

Sad news this month, announcing the death of Revd Nick Tucker RIP (Priest in Charge of Uley, Owlpen & Nympsfield 1988-2006) on Christmas Day after some months of illness. Nick & Cathy had lived happily in Tetbury since his retirement, and he died surrounded by his beloved large family. Here's just one lovely story from Nick's legacy in our community.

Uley Singing Allsorts has just celebrated its 20th birthday with a lovely concert in the Village Hall in December. Just over 20 years ago Revd Nick gave every member of the congregation £10 and told the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25: 14-30), issuing an invitation to use it in any way of choice. Hilary Weeks decided to use her £10 to start a community choir, and with friend and neighbour Pauline, got to work to get a group singing. Once underway much debate followed about a name for the choir (uley belles? hetty peglars?) until Pat Fisher suggested "Bassetts"! ("well, you sing Allsorts don't you?", she said), at which point Uley Singing Allsorts was born!

Maybe there are other recollections of how Nick's Talent challenge was taken up and made fruitful? Do share your memories.

It was great to have the whole school and their families in Church once again, for the end of term Christmas service. We are delighted to be able to promote Uley School with their banner displayed on the railings below the church and have been able to provide them with a "Lollipop" to enhance safety as they cross the road from school in future. We all look forward to welcoming everyone again, as the Easter Season will be upon us before we can look round!

We continue to warmly welcome our 2024 wedding couples as they make their regular visits to us so they can be married in Uley, Owlpen and Nympsfield. Couples will also have the chance to meet together at a Wedding Preparation Day at the end of February – it was a most enjoyable and happy event last year.

Lastly, YES PLEASE to used printer ink (but not toner!) and cartridges for recycling! There is a box in the church porch – proceeds benefit British Red Cross, the latest box sent for recycling has just raised £35!

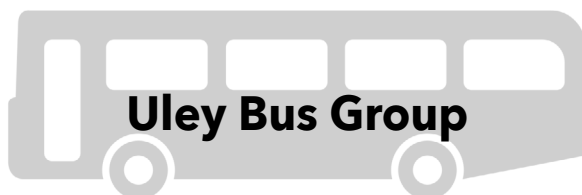
At present, we have eight volunteers who manage Uley Millennium Green on behalf of the village. We normally meet 4 times a year (including the AGM) to organise and manage

Church Letter

These days, commercial pressures help make us celebrate Christmas before it comes, and see it as finished almost as soon as Christmas Day is over. But the Church officially starts Christmas on Christmas night, and continues it for twelve or even forty days, ending only with the Presentation of Jesus in the temple, Candlemass. So I write this quite early in the forty days of Christmas, and it will be published in time for the celebration of the presenting of Jesus in the temple. That is recorded by Luke to stress again Jesus' fulfilling the Law God gave to Moses, and that is important to us because it shows God's **faithfulness**. If God is faithful to his agreement with his ancient people, he will be faithful to us. The event tells of the old godly people, Simeon and Anna, rejoicing in Jesus. Mary is a young mother; we don't know how old Joseph was! Jesus was a baby. So the story reminds us that God cares for all ages.

Simeon spoke what has become one of the songs of the Church at evening services, the Nunc Dimittis – 'Now you dismiss.' He called Jesus, 'A light to give light to the gentiles, [= the nations, the non-Jews,] and

the glory of your people Israel.' Jesus fulfils God's promises to Israel and opens God's love and faithfulness to us and all people. God in Christ is for all people, Jews and gentiles. Simeon's song about light is why the feast was celebrated with candles and is called Candlemass. Light is a symbol of life, freedom, truth and safety – robbers tend to rob at night, and you don't know where you are and can't do much safely in the dark. Jesus comes to give us light and final salvation – safety and fullness of life.

Simeon in the temple already looked forward to Jesus' sufferings, and warned Mary her soul would be pierced with grief's sword. And this month will also see the beginning of Lent, the time of preparation for the celebration of Jesus' dying and rising, for the fulfilment of the Passover, for Easter. The Passover celebrated God's great rescue of his people from slavery in Egypt, by plaguing the Egypt oppressors, culminating in the death of their firstborn sons.

The Exodus is about God saving the good and punishing the wicked. Evil does indeed bring disaster – the results of greed and carelessness today are the threat of a climate catastrophe. But in Christ, God

reaches out to all. And, as none of us is perfect, if God only cares for the good, it is a poor lookout for us all. On the cross, Jesus, God the Son, took the place of the lambs which were sacrificed by the Israelites so that their sons did not die too. But thus he took the place of the Egyptian sons who died. He took the place of all who suffer, innocent and guilty, to bring us forgiveness and new life. In Egypt, the king lost his son. So we can say that, if Jesus took the place of the king's son, God the father took the place of the king, the Pharaoh. God takes responsibility for all our evils and sufferings, to bring us through to new life, shown in Jesus' resurrection. At the cross, Jesus was faithful to God and us even to death. But God the Father was faithful to Jesus, bringing him through to resurrection, and was faithful to us too, to the point of enduring his beloved Son's sufferings for us, sufferings that, as a loving Father, he shared. In that faithful love we can trust, in good times and bad, and know that, if we do not reject God's love, then, if suffering comes, God will see us through it to a final share in his eternal joy in love.

Faithfulness is something that continues over time. It requires patience, endurance, stickability. If we don't show our patience and endurance by the disciplines of

waiting in Advent, let's do so in Lent. The disciplines of Lent are not some effort to show how good we are, or even to make us healthier by fasting. They are to help us respond in faithfulness to God's faithfulness. On Ash Wednesday, we read Jesus' teaching on almsgiving, fasting and prayer. These are vital disciplines and expressions of faithfulness to God and others. Alms, charity, is giving and caring for the needy. Fasting can take various forms, and is of no use without giving and prayer. But to desist from constantly placing ourselves and our appetites and desires first is necessary if we are to love and care for God, who is love, and for other people and our environment. And prayer, listening to God, thinking and talking with God, giving attention to being with God, is essential too.

So, Happy Candlemass: may we know God's light.

Happy Lent: may we open ourselves to grow in love.

And Happy Easter: may we know God's forgiveness, and share God's life and love for ever.

I've built up a bit of debt and I am panicking. Even though I cut back, my spending has gone up and what I have coming in just doesn't stretch as far as it used to. What can I do?

The first step is to **collect all the information you have about your debts**, this might include contracts, bills and statements.

Next, make a list of your debts and write down the details of each. This could include who you owe money to, when you first missed a payment, and how much you now owe. You'll also need to make a note of your account or reference number and what steps the person or company has taken to get the money back, eg. sending you letters.

If you are behind on household bills, prioritise paying your rent or mortgage, plus energy bills and Council Tax first. Not paying these bills has the most serious consequences. You should speak

to the person or company you owe money to, to see if there are any manageable steps you can take to start reducing your debt.

Once you've got these debts under control, you should look at any other debts like credit card or store card debts, payday loans or missed Buy Now Pay Later payments.

You can find further advice on dealing with debts, as well as support for energy and living costs, and possible benefit entitlement, on the Citizens Advice website – www.citizensadvice.org.uk

There is also emergency support that you may be able to access, such as a food bank or fuel vouchers.

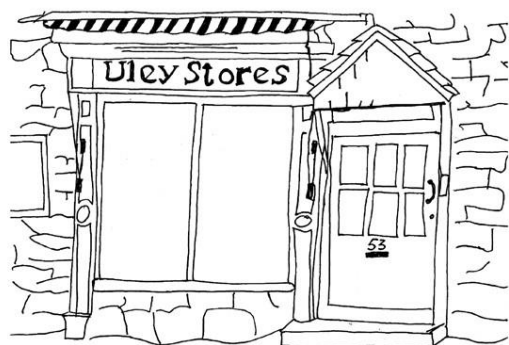
