Collect

O God, the protector of all who trust in you, without whom nothing is strong, nothing is holy: increase and multiply upon us your mercy; that with you as our ruler and guide we may so pass through things temporal that we lose not our hold on things eternal; grant this, heavenly Father, for our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Old Testament Reading: Zechariah 9: 9-12

Rejoice greatly, O daughter Zion! Shout aloud, O daughter Jerusalem! Lo, your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious is he, humble and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey. He will cut off the chariot from Ephraim and the warhorse from Jerusalem: and the battle bow shall be cut off, and he shall command peace to the nations; his dominion shall be from sea to sea, and from the River to the ends of the earth.

As for you also, because of the blood of my covenant with you, I will set your prisoners free from the waterless pit. Return to your stronghold, O prisoners of hope; today I declare that I will restore to you double.

New Testament Reading: Romans 7: 15-25a I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. Now if I do what I do not want, I agree that the law is good. But in fact it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. For I know that nothing good dwells within me, that is, in my flesh. I can will what is right, but I cannot do it. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. So I find it to be a law that when I want to do what is good, evil lies close at hand. For I delight in the law of God in my inmost self, but I see in my members another law at war with the law of my mind, making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!

Holy Gospel: Matthew 11: 16-19, 25-30

Jesus said; "But to what will I compare this generation? It is like children sitting in the marketplaces and calling to one another, 'We played the flute for you, and you did not dance; we wailed, and you did not mourn.' For John came neither eating nor drinking, and they say, 'He has a demon'; the Son of Man came eating and drinking, and they say, 'Look, a glutton and a drunkard, a friend of tax collectors and sinners!' Yet wisdom is vindicated by her deeds."

At that time Jesus said, "I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and the intelligent and have revealed them to infants; yes, Father, for such was your gracious will. All things have been handed over to me by my Father; and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him. Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and vou will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

Reflection

Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

What is that people want of Jesus? When He asked the disciples "who do people say that I am?" it might not have been surprising if the disciples had truthfully said "well some say trouble!" Reading the gospels it is clear that Jesus created a tension in people's lives.

From the outset the first request was often by way of a question, what do you want of me? Were people ready to think, rather than be told what they should do, or how they should live their lives? Being told is easier and arguably requires less effort and commitment, so perhaps it is better to do as we are told. But Jesus poses questions and we are made to think about things as important as - who He is, what is He saying and how does it make a difference to the way that I look at life and to live the life that I have been given?

Matthew in this 11th chapter reading, picks up on that tension by focusing on people's perception of both John the Baptist and Jesus. John was strange, unconventional, challenging and Jesus too choose the the outcast and ate with "sinners", what did this convey to the world at large? Where was God in all of this if He chooses to reveal Himself in such strange characters? Both Jesus and John forced people then and still now to confront the perception of holiness and therefore what we understand to be the will and purpose of God in our lives.

Jesus' invitation to come to Him and to offload our burdens onto Him is wonderfully reassuring. Yet perhaps it takes courage to acknowledge that our needs and our lives, cannot be lived without some help. When we call upon Him, we call out to one who loves, whatever our frailty and need. Might not the image that we long for most in the world today, is an image of care, understanding, compassion and gentleness?

What is it that we want from the Christ in our lives today?
