

Cam and Uley Family Practice Update

As part of general service improvements, Uley Surgery will initially extend opening hours for both the Reception and Dispensary, in early January 2026, on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from 0800 to 1830hours. Once staffing levels permit, opening hours on Thursday and Friday will also be extended. This brings the Uley Surgery opening hours in line with those at Cam Surgery.

Parishioners will be pleased to hear that negotiations between the Partners and the owner of the Uley Surgery premises are well advanced, with the hope that the purchase of the premises will be completed by mid-2026.

Stroud District Council is asking residents to help identify and map organisations across the district that support women and girls - The goal is to create a comprehensive directory of organisations working in this area. This will help strengthen partnerships, improve access to support, and identify gaps in provision. This is intended to help build a safer district by sharing organisations supporting women and girls at the start of 16 Days of Activism against gender-based violence.

The Knoll

At it's December meeting the Council heard from the Chair about some progress by SDC in its plans to demolish the existing eight dwellings on the Knoll and replace them with 18 dwellings. Several residents voiced their concerns about construction traffic, increased traffic and parking once the new dwellings are occupied

and overwhelming the drainage infrastructure. SDC have promised to update the Council in January. Once more information is publicly available, the Council will look to invite SDC planning officials to a public meeting, hopefully sometime early in the New Year

Church Letter

Happy New Year!

January is a time for new beginnings and resolutions to do a bit better. With waists and pockets stretched by Christmas we move into the part of winter when little by little the days lengthen and snowdrops are poised to poke their heart-shaped heads through the hard ground. How is your heart? I'm not thinking about blood pressure, cholesterol and blocked arteries - important though these are - but rather wondering how hopeful or happy you are as we enter this new year? There's not much of our lives that doesn't begin with imagination and how we feel, think and behave as we enter 2026 is no doubt shaped by how we imagine things are and will be. What is shaping and inspiring our imaginations?

Can we dare to imagine a year where we grow in openness to beauty, goodness and truth?

Can we dare to imagine a year when old grudges are put to rest and friendship embraced?

Can we dare to imagine a year when we will be taken beyond ourselves? Be willing to pay the cost of committing to a way that will challenge us, be painful or inconvenient for the sake of the good of another?

Can we dare to imagine a year when the shock of unexpected griefs and losses are

cushioned by kindness and care? Can we dare to imagine a year where conversation, shared enjoyment and celebration brighten our days?

I believe that Jesus shows us what the good life is like and that Christian worship. at its best, inspires our imaginations and forms us in a particular way, challenging the hopeless and divisive narratives of our times. Many of us won't have experienced church in this way and may have given up on the possibility of holding faith and flourishing within the Christian tradition. I spent much of my childhood thinking that the Christian faith was about trying to be good and getting things right, before experiencing myself so utterly loved by God, at which point began a journey of self-acceptance and challenge and growth.

If you would like to explore what the Christian tradition has to offer, you are of course always welcome to come along to church on a Sunday morning to experience something of community and worship or please get in touch if you'd like to talk. On 11th January, the short informal Second Sunday service at St Giles will be exploring baptism. Perhaps you were baptised as a baby, have had or would like your own children to be baptised or are interested in becoming baptised as an adult, or are simply curious about this ancient Christian ritual of entry into the church family. Baptisms won't be taking place on the day, but we will wonder about its mattering and its meaning.

Everyone is welcome regardless of where we might be on our journey of faith and however much noise we might make!

Garden Notes

The Taste of Sunshine

In this most tedious of months, diets, debts and dark, dreary weather prevail. However, the brief season of joy is also upon us! Seville Oranges will be on the shelves this month, so it's time to make marmalade/or freeze them till you're ready.

I can recommend a trip to Seville to experience firsthand the fragrance of 'azahar' (orange blossom) which pervades the city and is at strongest from February through March. It is indeed a distinctive and integral part of Sevilles history. Hercules, legendary founder of Seville, is referred to around the city and one of the 12 tasks assigned to him by King Eurystheus was to travel to Africa to steal the 'golden apples' of immortality rumoured to be an orange.

Naranja Amarga (bitter orange) was introduced in the 10th century to Europe by Genovese sailors from Asia. Rumoured to bring happiness, the Moors planted bitter orange trees all over Spain but concentrated in Andalusia. Today there are more than 48,000 trees across the city yielding 5.7 million kilos of oranges. Many tons of these lie in streets creating a hazard for pedestrians and cleaning crews and so the city has initiated a pilot scheme for turning unwanted oranges into sustainable electricity using the methane as the fruit ferments into clean electricity. Most orchards in the regions surrounding Seville export their harvest to the UK for marmalade and to France

as it's a key ingredient of Cointreau and Grand Marnier. Locally it is used to make a variety of products from baked goods and chocolates, jams, liqueurs, wines and lotions. My favourite is to find a reputable taberna to sample the aperitif Vino de Naranja made with sweet white wine and bitter peel. There are plenty of cheap imitations on offer so chose carefully.

Marmalade

The name originates from Portugal in Tudor times, evolving from a quince paste know as marmelada. Although the earliest handwritten recipe was in the Scottish highlands in 1683, it was first produced commercially in 1767 by a Scottish grocer called James Keiller. The fruit gave the marmalada a bitter complexity and proved to be a big hit.

Marmalade under threat

Sweetening palettes, cheap spread alternatives, perceptions of being an old fashioned preserve have combined with a decline in traditional marmalade making skills. Across the globe, citrus orchards are being threatened by Yellow Dragon disease. The bacteria is carried by the psylla fly. Once infected the tree can die within 5 years. There are now programs to protect citrus through proactively encouraging wildlife that prey on the carrier insect by creating habitats in and around groves.




