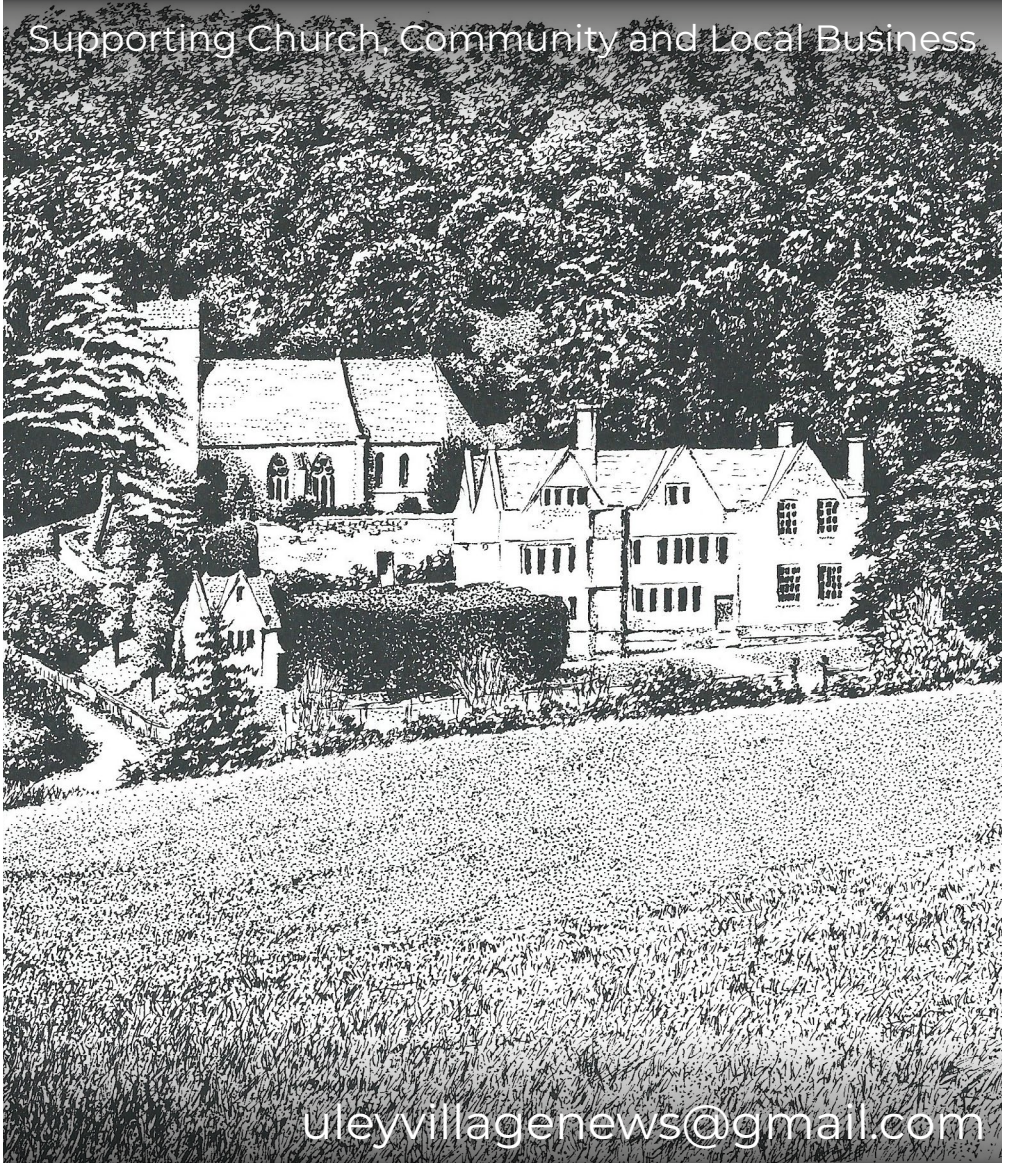

Police Community Support Officer

Abbi Barker gave an informative report to the July 2nd Meeting. She noted that a PCSO is the link between the Police and the community. Very happy to attend community events, undertake reassurance visits, submit intelligence and work alongside Police officers. She noted that PCSO's cannot arrest anyone and do not carry any asp or pava spray.

Abbi noted that they do not get many calls to Uley as a whole. This year, so far, the main calls have been incidents of suspicious circumstances. This can be anything from door to door salesmen to someone acting suspiciously. The next highest number of incidents is abandoned 999 calls with 8 incidents reported so far this year. These incidents normally tend to be pocket dials. The best way to contact the Police in an emergency is 999. If it is not an emergency its 101 or by using the online form. This form can be found on the Gloucestershire Constabulary website under Report a Crime and works in the same way as 101.

Just a few tips for keeping your property safe, especially when the evenings start to become darker. Outside lights, especially motion detector ones are a great deterrent. CCTV or ring doorbells are also great to have, just make sure you have a sign up somewhere to say you have CCTV recording. Always leave a light on when going out when it's dark, Abbi can provide timer switches if anyone needs one.

As the end of term nears, we'll be preparing to host the Uley School leavers service which is indeed a celebration of the years spent at primary school and a chance to pray for our young leavers as they prepare the next steps onto big school. The St Giles church entrance is also filling up with boxes of all sizes and shapes – a hint that holiday club is around the corner and junk modelling will once more be one of the activities on offer. We hope all the kids and helpers have a really fun time this year.

David, Nikki, Pat and Moya (from Uley, Nympsfield and Owlpen Parish) together with Chris and Danny (Dursley Parish) had the chance to attend a service of graduation ourselves at an 'Archdeacons Visitation' service at Minchinhampton (see picture) where outgoing churchwardens were thanked and prayed for and the new churchwardens were commissioned and installed. It was lovely to have Ian Gardner there to 'support' us. We all remembered our dear Pauline in our prayers - she of course passed away last November 'in harness' as a churchwarden. It was a great gathering of churchwardens, and 7 out of 8 of the Deaneries in Gloucester Diocese were represented – a good coverage



A fairly quiet month on the church fabric front, though local stonemason & conservator Graham O'Hare has done a marvellous job of restoring two chest tombs in Nympsfield churchyard, saving them from eventual total collapse. He has also examined and advised on a chest tomb in Uley churchyard which is leaning over to the extent that a carved urn on the top looks in danger of falling off and possibly shattering. Graham has declared it OK at present, but we will keep monitoring it closely.

Sadly, we'll be holding funeral services in the near future – probably before this issue reaches you - for Duff Hart-Davies, Paul Fisher, Jean Beeston and Edward Seager, where we can celebrate their lives and console their friends and families as they are laid to rest. Paul, together with his late wife Anne, was a staunch member of the Nympsfield congregation, Duff was a pillar of Owlpen Church for many years, until quite recently, and Jean was a long term member of the congregation – and indeed the choir – at Uley. May they all rest in peace.

Changes at Cam & Uley Family Practice

Opening Hours at Uley Surgery

The Practice are currently working with the Reception Team to agree an increase to the opening hours at Uley Surgery, which will eventually be the same as those at Cam Surgery – 0800 to 1830hours Monday to Friday.

In the interim, there is likely to be increased hours on some days each week until there are sufficient staff to ensure Reception cover throughout the week.

Trial of SystmConnect to support improved Triage of Patient Contacts with the Practice

We are pleased to announce that from Monday 4th August, we will be trialling a new system to support patient contacts with the Practice which is called SystmConnect. This is much more User Friendly than the current on-line request system.

With SystmConnect, you'll be able to request help or an appointment by filling out a simple online form via the NHS App/AirMid or our Practice Website. A member of our team will review your form and ensure you get the most appropriate appointment or care. Changes to the App and the website will not be available until the start date.

Don't worry if you don't have online access — our friendly Reception Team is here to

help you complete the form in person at the Surgery or over the phone.
Important:

As we prepare to trial this new system, GP appointments will not be bookable beyond 1st August. All appointments from 4th August onwards will be managed through the SystmConnect.

Garden Notes

I fervently pray that the cracks that have opened up around the garden will have been quenched by obliging overnight rains for the month of July and we don't have a hosepipe ban... one can dream.

This year the garden seems to have accelerated through the growing season driven on by the hot, dry and windy weather. In a blink of an eye.. I virtually missed collecting yellow rattle seeds, could hardly keep up with staking and deadheading, let alone the watering, as week after week of drying winds and soaring temperatures took their toll on the garden, the wildlife and me.

Of course we will live to fight another day but our struggling wildlife may not without our help. They need : shelter, food and water especially as juicy worms retreat to deeper soil as the surface dries and hardens.

Helping Wildlife in Drought

- Provide water in shallow bowls for bees, birds and insects. Fill with pebbles in different levels to support small critters
- Provide shallow bathing water for birds and mammals with easy exits
- Place water in shade, keeping topped up and clean regularly
- Make a habitat log pile
- Keep wildflower and meadow grasses uncut for a cool refuge
- Don't be too tidy - leave overgrown plants for shade and cover
- Water and dead head pollinator friendly (usually single flowers) summer flowers

to extend the nectar flow season

- If you have any size of pond, ensure wildlife can access water as levels have dropped massively this year
- As hedgehogs main food source of worms has dried up - supplement feed with wet cat or dog food
- Hoglets need help to reach a sustainable weight to survive winter hibernation approx 500g

Coping with your garden in drought

.. and when you're busy with visitors / everyone at home

- Let lawns go. They'll soon bounce back with some future rain
- Don't feed dry plants
- A light pot is a dry pot (obviously doesn't apply to terracotta!)
- Soak pots if possible in a bucket of water to thoroughly rehydrate a dry rootball
- Pick flowers in the morning when they're plump and will last longer
- Some leafy veg like spinach, parsley etc will bolt.. not much to be done other than keep watering and harvest regularly
- Keep an eye out for scale in these warm conditions.. particularly on citrus but also many other plants.. often you notice ants 'farming' them first
- If you have trees and shrubs less than a year old, water long and deep once a week at the roots

Church Letter

Welcome to what used to be called the “holiday month”

Waiting in A. & E. at Gloucester Royal hospital a few weeks back as the clock crept towards midnight, I reflected, as you do, on the amount of time in our lives we spend waiting: Waiting for exam results, sometimes with a sense of impending doom; then later on waiting for a phone call from the new girl friend. In the 1970’s it was only a landline. Then on to waiting for test results from the doctors about the possibility of a cancer diagnosis; waiting by the bedside of a friend who is dying.

All these experiences of waiting are imposed upon us at different times of our lives. Some of them are excited waiting with something good at the end, others are less so for they may bring expected bad news. It is part of the human condition that we have to wait and be patient.

Yet waiting is anathema in our present world. Instant communication, increasingly speedy internet connections have become our birthright. And yet are we any the wiser, richer, or happier because we receive the latest parcel from Amazon more quickly?

There is however a different sort of waiting which is not imposed on us. It is expressed better in the word “Tarry” a word which has gone out of fashion. It is word which suggests an intention to be still and watch and wait. Rowan Williams says that we can use the image of bird watching to describe the value of tarrying or waiting. He writes:

“The experienced birdwatcher sitting still, poised, alert, not tense or fussy, knows that that this is the kind of place where something extraordinary suddenly bursts into view.” He loves the image of waiting on God as birdwatching. “You sit very still because something is liable to burst into view, and sometimes of course it means sitting in the rain with nothing very much happening. I suspect that for most of us a lot of our experience is precisely that. But the odd occasions when you do see what TS Eliot (In Burnt Norton) called the “kingfisher’s wing flashing light to light” make it all worthwhile. And I think that living in this sort of expectancy – living in awareness, your eyes sufficiently open to your mind both relaxed and attentive enough to see that when it happens – is basic to discipleship.”

He encourages us to believe that part of the Christian life is to learn to wait, with this expectation for the moment of seeing, understanding, or wonder. In fact he makes it clear that unless we set time aside even just for a few moments there will be much that we miss about the beauty of the world and the possibility of God. His thoughts remind me of some words of that wonderful Welsh poet, R. S. Thomas, who realises he has missed a flash of sunlight on a hillside because he is hurrying. He writes: "Life is not hurrying onto a receding future, nor

hankering after an imagined past, but the turning aside....."

Perhaps, in this quieter month of August, it will benefit all of us to explore the value of intentional waiting: perhaps to take notice of the beauty of a sunset, to read a short poem, to be still. Perhaps we might even discover the benefit of not racing to the next event in your life?

This month we were given an inspirational talk by two amazing women who started a small charity in Gloucestershire called CALM (Children achieving lifelong movement) about 10 years ago. Possibly the only one in the country, it provides intensive physiotherapy for young children with severe mobility issues caused by strokes, rheumatoid arthritis and other debilitating conditions. We were shocked to learn that the NHS does not provide long-term physiotherapy for very young children. With the support of a generous physiotherapy practice with a well-equipped gym, they are transforming the lives of at least a dozen children in Gloucestershire. 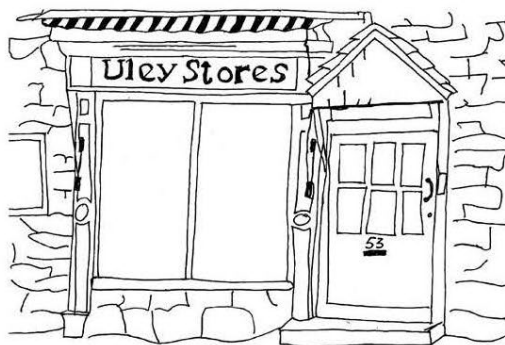

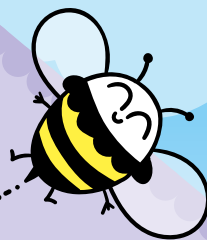

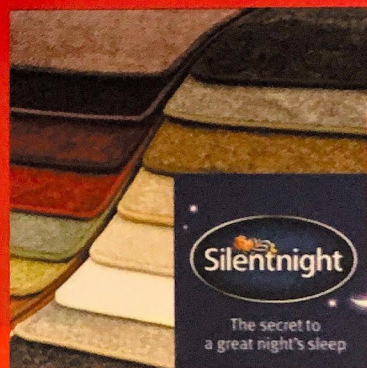
